

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# Lancelot



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#### **Purple Flowers**

Dear Sir,

When we arrived on holiday this year we were struck by seeing so many flowers in bloom. The hills and valleys of the countryside were full of poppies and daisies and a host of other colourful wildflowers. One violet/purple plant stood out in abundance all over the island especially along the coast. Could you tell us its name?

GUINEVERE The purple plant you refer to is barrilla or saltwort, whose ashes are a source of impure sodium carbonate. Known in Spanish as barilla, in the nineteenth century these ashes were used in the manufacture of soap and glass. At that time Lanzarote barilla was highly prized and the entire crop purchased by traders in London. Even nowadays locals use crushed barilla

to remove stains from their hands and garments.

Because of this colour the islands of Lanzarote and Fuerteventura were known as Las Purpurias, or the Purple Ones, on account of the predominance of this wild plant along the coast. The pre-Hispanic name of the island is Titeroygatra which translates as the Rose-coloured Hill, presumably for the same reason.

Historians believe that the appearance of these plants on the coasts was noted by sailors from Italy early in the 14th century who reported on this when they returned to their home port in Genoa. At that time Genoa was a city-state where textiles and dyeing were amongst the most important industries in Europe. This led to Lanzarotto Malocello, a member of one of the leading merchant families to set sail for the islands.

He was the merchant adventurer who brought this island group in

the Atlantic to the attention of the European Powers especially this island which was referred to on maps as "found by Lanzarotto Malocello" and has been called by his name ever since. This led to the Normans landing here in 1492 and annexing the territory to Spain who had financed the expedition after France declined .

#### **Volcanic Heat**

Dear Sir.

I have visited the Canaries for many years and I wondered whether the underground volcanic heat from the numerous volcanoes on each of the islands cannot be used to generate electricity. A friend of mine has just returned from a holiday in Iceland and he brought me the following report in a newspaper article on the subject.

'Icelend is a pioneer in the use of geothermal energy for space heating. Generating electricity with



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geothermal energy has increased significantly in recent and geothermal power facilities currently generate 25% of the country's total electricity production.

During the course of the 20th century Iceland went from what was one of Europe's poorest countries, dependent upon peat and imported coal for its energy, to a country with a high standard of living where practically all stationary energy is derived from renewable resources and geothermal sources accounts for 66% of Iceland's primary energy use.

I don't know what the legal situation is in the Canaries (Spain) but the ownership of resources inside the ground is the property of the State of Iceland, unless others can prove their right of ownership. From the earliest of times, geothermal energy has been used for bathing and washing and continues to be used for many other purposes.

Geothermal energy is a renewable energy source that can be utilised in a sustainable or excessive manner. Excessive production from a geothermal field can only be maintained for a relatively short time, and can indicate overinvestment in wells and power plant equipment. As a result of a rapid expansion in Iceland's energy intensive industry, the demand for electricity has increased considerably in recent years. I hope the Canary Islands which follows a strict policy of sustainability, can harness volcanic energy in a similar manner.

#### **Dollar Bay**

Our family has just returned from a diving holiday on Lanzarote which we very much enjoyed. Close to where we live in Ireland is a resort called Dollar Bay on the Hook Peninsula which has an annual diving contest which is somehow connected to Lanzarote. Can you tell us why? Yours sincerely,

GUINEVERE A famous Scottish seaman and historian, George Glas, wrote a landmark history of the ancient inhabitants of Lanzarote and Fuerteventura which was published in London in 1760, and again in Ireland in 1764, and is still used by scholars. Glas was returning to

England with his wife and daughter in his boat the Earl of Sandwich, when four members of the crew mutinied and killed Glas and his family off the coast of Wexford as they suspected he was carrying a large amount of the fortune he had amassed whilst trading in the Canary Islands. Among the treasures were hundreds of gold doubloons many of which were found by fishermen over the next few years.

A nearby cove was named Dollar Bay because of the incident. The Hook Peninsula Tourist Authority used to hold an annual dive at Dollar Bay at which divers were invited to try their luck in a search for the hidden gold coins. Last year El Grifo, a local vineyard, named a red dessert wine George Glas, in his memory. Bye the way, the mutineers were captured and hanged in Dublin. An original copy of his book is preserved in the library of Trinity College, Dublin.

# **Gofio** Dear Sir.

What is the origin of the local dish Gofio?

GUINEVERE Gofio is a cereal said to have been the staple diet of the pre-Hispanic Guanche inhabitants of the Canary Islands. It consists of maize roasted, then ground to flour and used as a breakfast cereal, a thickener for soups, as biscuit dough and in dumplings, it is also referred to as the forerunner of cornflakes.

Before the arrival of the Norman at the beginning of the 15th century only barley was known, it was only after the colonisation that wheat and some pulses such as chickpeas and beans were added. In the 16th century the range of cereals was increased with the spread arrival of millet from the American colonies which soon became popular and spread all over the Islands. The original inhabitants would toast the gofio in earthernware pots and then use hand-grinders made from porous basalt stones of different shapes.

During the 1940s the Canary Islands went through a period of extreme hardship due to its isolation from mainland Spain during the Civil War, 1936-1939 followed by WW2 1939-1945. The belligerents on both sides denying their opponents access to the Archipelago putting a virtual stranglehold on the import and export of vital goods and supplies to feed the population. The economy of the Islands, so closely linked to the UK and Europe through its fruit and vegetable exports was adversely affected and was faced with one of the most difficult decades in its history.

During this period of depriva-

tion and starvation Gofio became the salvation. During those years of hunger it became the staple diet of the Canary Islanders who mixed the life-saving cereal with milk, broth, honey, oil or water. When there was a scarcity of wheat, millet or barley, wild cereals from shrubby plants and berries from trees were used.

# **Tenerife Lace** Dear Sir.

An article on traditional clothing on Lanzarote in a previous issue referred to Tenerrife Lace. Do you have any more details about it and why was Tenerrife spelt with two 'rs" rather than the customary one 'r'?

**GUINEVERE** Although Tenerife the island is always spelt this way, somehow traditional items are sometimes spelt with an additional 'r'. The spelling of the names of several islands, have undergone changes over the years. cording to Rowena Spencer M.D. a Canary Island Descendent from San Bernard, Louisiana, the lace is used as decoration for individual medallions sewn on to garments with or without cutting away the underlying fabric. Sometimes several can be tacked together to make a doily or a table covering they can be attached to the end of a garment or curtain or hung on a curtain or







Christmas tree. Nowadays Teneriffe lace usually consists of a medallion of radial threads all of which cross the centre of the circle, recalling the fine tracery of the spider's web. The method used for making it on Tenerife resembles needle weaving but is typically more open and delicate. Variations are created by changing the shapes of the open spaces and by interlocking the free-spanning threads. Oddly made shapes may also be made with the threads running radially or at right angles to each other.

Teneriffe lace is thought to have its origins in the Middle Ages developed from the technique of linen drawn work (pulled thread work). Threads pulled from four sides of a rectangle of fabric leaving a square open area at each corner and a web of threads across this space was filled in with embroidery stitches which were later adapted for

use in Tenerife. In the 17th century, lace makers began using pins set in a firm pin-cushion around which to "stretch the web" which still popular today using a weighted cushion or a metal, wood or rubber frame. These rigid foundations are more convenient and efficient than the flexible linen on which basting stitches must be made and later removed.

#### **Brian Eno**

Dear Sir.

In a report about the resumption of concerts at Jameos del Agua Auditorium following the Covid 19 restrictions which listed several international artists who have performed there over the years including Brian Eno. I have been a fan of his since Roxy Music right through his solo career and as a producer of other artists such as David Bowie U2 and Coldplay. As he came to Lanzarote to play and set up a video insta-


llation in the Green Caves in the mid 1980s, did he have anything to say about his switch from 'glam rock' to ambient music?

**GUINEVERE** Brian Eno's connection with Lanzarote began when he was invited to perform at a Visual Music Festival at Jameos del Agua in 1986 founded by multi-faceted local artist Ildefonso Aguilar. Whilst on the island he was fascinated to hear palm leaves rustling in the wind and recorded the sound. He went on a four hour solitary walk through the Fire Mountains and upon returning he said, when he saw the red and white barrier at the entrance to the Volcanic Route, he felt they were the most vivid colours he had ever seen in his life.

'It reminded me of the remarks







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made by one of the first astronauts to land on the moon who said that everything seemed to be grey at first but after a while you begin to notice the difference between the various shades of grey. I thought all the volcanic rock was one colour for the first half hour or so and then began to distinguish between the various shades.'

A Lancelot reporter asked him why the majority of his musical output was devoted to ambient music which was so different from the mainstream pop he had recorded with Roxy Music or had produced with David Bowie and Talking Heads. He replied, 'It is not a case of ambient being a different kind of music. It's more a change of one's perception in what you do with the music. Music is not ephemeral, it is solid like a sculpture or a painting. It should be part of the atmosphere, part of the environment. You don't expect look

at a painting for forty-five minutes, take it down and put it away. You have it there and occasionally you enter into it.'

'Music should be the same. One of the problems is that most composers think that this attitude is a demotion of their creativity. But it isn't it's a new perception, a new way to like and enjoy it. It does not do away with the traditional ways of composing, listening or making records, it is purely a new dimension.'

'Convention has it that there is a certain pattern of synchronisation running through most music, and composers think that it is expected of them to write with a vertical cross-section going through the whole piece. Take rock music for example. You know there is an intro, a verse, a middle eight or chorus with a hook line here or there. Classical music as such has a similar pat-

tern running through it, as in a symphony or a concerto, and however varied the compositions, a certain pattern exists and is recognisable.'

'Now, I believe that this is contra to what happens in real life. Take meteorological cycles, for example, what creates a high zone, is all different cycles moving at different times, and at certain times, by chance, they all peak together. This creates a certain weather pattern, but this is neither predictable or a process that regularly repeats itself. A unique harvest, for instance. But the same thing never happens every day or every year at the same time.'

'The same applies to music. I deliberately compose music to not follow a pattern, but to peak in the same manner (as the weather). If I may say so, when it does all synchronise, it is by chance, i.e. unsynchronised cycles.

myself ten minutes. Nothing at first sight, then an old Spanish 25 peseta coin - so clearly the sand hadn't been replaced for a long time!




### "Thank You Lanzarote!"

To convey my personal thanks to all in Lanzarote, I am attaching a photograph set against suitably exotic foliage — and, yes, it was taken at our campus in Chichester!







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


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# A Lasting Impression

To a newcomer such as myself, Lanzarote is paradoxically beautiful. It is in many ways defined by a single phenomenon, volcanoes, and its element of uniformity is uniquely stunning. But the environmental complexity of a volcanic archipelago -an a recently active one at that- has given rise to a captivating variety of landscapes, deep cultural history, and undeniable charm. These photos are just a glimpse of the many varied and memorable moments that have stayed with me after my time on the island.





Rock Pigeons take advantage of the natural landscape and human presence. Their young are safe in nest scrapes underground in lava tunnel jameos, while the adults collect food in tourist-rich locations such as the camel rides in Timanfaya National Park



Montaña de Tinaguache under the unpolluted night sky is the picture of grandeur. An older, extinct volcano, its caldera is larger and more sunken than those further south



Endless, winding lava tubes are home to the sanctity of deafening stillness and every shade of pitch darkness. To traverse miles under the earth is to connect with a place in the deepest way possible, quite literally

## Main Fiscal Novelties 2023

2023 begins loaded with tax and tax news. In this post we will tell you about some of the most important ones, many of which include the already published Startups Law and the General State Budget Law for 2023.

# 1. Reduction for obtaining income from work (IRPF)

With effect from January 1, 2023, the amounts that will reduce the net income from work are increased, also increasing the amount below which this reduction is applied.

The reduction applies to those taxpayers with net income from work of less than 19,747.50 euros. Of course, if they do not have income, excluding exempt income, other than work income, greater than 6,500 euros.

Since January 1, 2023, the Personal Income Tax Law provides the following:

"Taxpayers with net income from work of less than 19,747.5 euros (before €16,825) as long as they do not have income, excluding exempt income, other than work income greater than 6,500 euros, will reduce the net income from work by the following amounts:

Taxpayers with net income from work equal to or less than 14,047.5 euros: 6,498 euros per year.

Taxpayers with net income from work between 14,047.5 and 19,747.5 euros: 6,498 euros minus the result of multiplying by 1.14 the difference between the income from work and 14,047.5 euros per year".

# 2. Changes for taxpayers who receive income from more than one payer (IRPF)

The threshold is raised, in such a way that taxpayers who receive earned income from more than one payer are not required if the sum of said returns does not exceed €15,000 (previously the limit was €14,000).

# 3. Corporate Tax: reduction in the tax rate for certain companies

The tax rate is reduced from 25 to 23% for entities whose net tur-

nover (INCN) for the immediately preceding tax period is less than €1,000,000 and is not considered a patrimonial entity.

For these purposes, the net amount of the turnover will be determined in accordance with the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of article 101 of the Corporation Tax Law.

# 4. New developments in the deduction for maternity

Another of the tax novelties that we highlight is the modification that has occurred in the requirements to be able to apply the deduction for maternity.

Now, women who have children under 3 years of age with the right to apply the minimum for descendants can reduce the differential fee by up to 1,200 euros per year for each child under three years of age until they reach that age, provided that one of these criteria is met. requirements:

At the time of the child's birth, they receive contributory or assistance benefits from the unemployment protection system.

At the time of the child's birth or at any later time, they are registered in the corresponding Social Security or mutual insurance scheme with a minimum period, in the latter case, of 30 days of contributions.

Until 2023, only mothers who were self-employed or employed by someone else for whom they were registered in the Social Security or Mutual Fund system received the aid of 100 euros per month per child.

Now, after this modification, as of January 1, 2023, all women who have children under three years of age may apply the maternity deduction.3. Corporate Tax: reduction in the tax rate for certain companies

The tax rate is reduced from 25 to 23% for entities whose net turnover (INCN) for the immediately preceding tax period is less than €1,000,000 and is not considered a patrimonial entity.

For these purposes, the net amount of the turnover will be determined in accordance with the provisions of sections 2 and 3 of article 101 of the Corporation Tax Law.

# 5. Change of coefficient in the calculation of the Municipal "Plusvalía"

In relation to the Tax on the Increase in Value of Urban Land, the amounts of the maximum coefficients applicable to the value of the land are updated according to the period of generation of the increase in value, for the purpose of determining the base of said tax, with the following generation periods and respective coefficients to set the tax (with effect from January 1, 2023):

6. Changes in the IS introduced by the Startups Law

In relation to emerging companies, the tax rate applicable to IS and IRNR is reduced, from 25% to 15%, during the first tax period in which the tax base is positive and the following three. For this situation to occur, taxpayers must maintain the status of "emerging company".

Secondly, it should be noted that the deferral of the IS or IRNR tax debt is allowed in the first two years from when the tax base is positive, without guarantees or late-payment interest, for a period of 12 and 6 months respectively. In addition, the obligation to make instalment payments of IS and IRNR is eliminated in the 2 years after the one in which the tax base is positive (provided that in those years they maintain the status of emerging company).

# A Brief Guide to Property Purchase



LANCELOT has prepared the following for the benefit of holidaymakers unfamiliar with the language and laws of Spain. It is not, and is not intended as, a substitute to advice from a solicitor and/or an estate agent.

Only buy from the office of an Estate Agent and seek the services of an independent solicitor.

It is not advisable to give anyone a GENE-RAL POWER OF ATTORNEY. Where necessary, it is prudent to grant a limited power of attorney (only) to an independent solicitor.

Do not believe that you are protected because the conveyance will be notarised, as the Notary presumes that you are acting on the advice of your Lawyer.

When buying property insist on the presence of an impartial sworn translator. By law a Notary can refuse to notarise a deed if the conveyance is not translated into the language of the party(ies) concerned.

Before you purchase make sure the Vendor has paid all back property taxes, Impuesto sobre bienes inmuebles, to the local Town Hall, by checking the receipts.

If, by purchasing, you will become a member of an Association of Owners, make sure that the Vendor has paid all his community bills. Also check on the liquidity of the Association itself, and examine their statutes, estatutos. Their rules may not permit you to keep your domestic pets.



Before buying land present a written enquiry at the local Town Hall (with a return address on the Island) asking if there is planning permission to build on the site of your choice and if any building restrictions apply there.

Instruct your solicitor to conduct a search at the Property Registry, Registro de la Propiedad, immediately before the conveyance and return there as soon as the notarised document can be collected from the Notary.

Make sure that your architect is one of the 24 members of the Canarian College of Architects working on Lanzarote, otherwise you will have to pay a second fee. If in doubt call the Colegio de Arquitectos in Arrecife on 928 800799 or fax: 928 800798. Spanish-speaking.

Puerto del Carmen

#### Central Southern Route La Geria

Puerto del Carmen, the island's largest tourist resort, has almost 13 kilometres of beaches and a picturesque fishing harbour in the Old Town. On the main Island highway close to the Puerto del Carmen turnoff, a road opposite leads to ASO-MADA. Drive through and turn left at the first T junction until reaching a main road. This is LA GERIA, the wine-growing region of Lanzarote where grapes are cultivated in a manner not used anywhere else in the world. The result is an unforgetteable landscape dominated by the sight of thousands of shallow pits stretching as far as the eye can see.

The young vines planted inside are covered with layers of porous black volanic grains which feed them moisture and protect them from the harsh rays of the sun. They are sheltered from the constant Trade Winds by the semi-circular walls of dry volcanic rock above.

#### **Puerto Calero Marina**

One of Europe's truly beautiful marinas in a magnificent setting which hosts international regattas. The bustling commercial area is enhanced by an open air Museum of Sculptures located among the landscaped pathways comprising 12 impressive pieces by important artists. Watch out for the Puerto Calero signpost on the main island road between Puerto del Carmen and Yaiza.

#### Yaiza and El Golfo

Turn left driving past UGA village until rejoining the Island highway where YAIZA is soon reached. The town square contains several buildings typical of Lanzarote's traditional architecture with the Town Hall at one end and the ancient Los Remedios Church at the other.

To the right a few kilometres along after the town is a sign to CHARCO DE LOS CLICHOS, the GREEN LAGOON, (and neighbouring EL GOLFO village), which is reached after a short ride along a winding picturesque coastal road. A brief stroll round the corner brings us to the GREEN LAGOON. Scientists are not absolutely certain as to the source of its colour, some believe it is caused by algae, others attribute it to the green olivine semi-precious stone, found in abundance on the Island. (There are several good fish restaurants around the bay at EL GOLFO).

Returning along the coast there is a large parking area to the right. The seas below can frequently be seen battering away at the cliffs trying to force a way through. During the



18th century volcanic eruptions, lava thrown out by the volcanoes covered a large area of the ocean in this area which it has been attempting to reclaim back ever since.

Yet another pretty scene just a few hundred metres along is presented by the JANUBIO salt ponds. Employing over one hundred workers at the turn of the century to provide sailing ships with salt for keeping food fresh, the salt works gradually fell into decline with the advent of refrigeration.

#### **Stratvs Vineyard**

Driving through La Geria from the direction of Yaiza, Bodegas Stratvs is on the right directly off the main road. The display at the shop in the spacious visitor's gallery offers a fascinating glimpse into traditional wine cultivation on Lanzarote. The vineyard is open 7

days a week 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and there are 2 daily guided tours by appointment. However, visitors can visit the premises and cafeteria without appointment.

#### Playa Blanca Papagayo Beaches

Twenty years ago a tiny fishing village, PLAYA BLANCA on the south coast, is now a flourishing but tranquil resort with a beautiful beach bordered by a picturesque restaurant-lined promenade. The small harbour is used by ferries sailing to Fuerteventura, the Fred Olsen Express car ferry makes the 20 minute crossing six times daily.

Close by along the headland to the east several paths lead to the magnificenti PAPAGAYO BEACHES. Composed of several small bays and coves, many consider these golden sands to be the most beautiful in Spain.

#### Marina Rubicón

This habour at Playa Blanca combines the most modern and well-equipped docks for sea-going yachts with the olde-world charm of traditional island architecture housing amenities and facilities on the shoreline including an art gallery. Two new deluxe hotels overlook the marina and the coastal promenade.

#### **The Fire Mountains**

Returning north on the main road turn left in YAIZA to MONTAÑAS DEL FUEGO, the FIRE MOUNTAINS, part of TIMANFAYA NATIONAL PARK. This region was devastated by intermittent volcanic eruptions over a six year period, 1730 - 1736. The scenery is both breathtaking and vividly awesome, a few hundred metres to the left a string of camels await passengers for a scenic ride round the rim of a volcano.

The red and white barrier at a toll booth signals arrival at the road which leads to the parking area at Hilario's Plateau.

Here the DIABLO RESTAURANT serves meals from a grill fitted across a natural volcanic chasm, with geothermic heat rising from the bowels of the volcano cooking the food!

A coach fitted with multi-lingual commentary leaves to tour the nearby region of volcanic destruction taking a route offering the clearest indication of what took place here some two and a half centuries ago. There are stops for photographs and the 45 minute trip is included in the price of the admission fee to the Park. Open daily 09.00 - 17.00 hrs.

For the best times and conditions to visit the Cabildo Tourist Centres download the CACT Lanzarote App at Apple Play or Google Store.

#### **Timanfaya Information**

On exiting via the barrier turn left and after two kilometres watch out for the Timanfaya Visitors Centre on the left before Mancha Blanca. This is an excellent source of multilingual information about the Park and its volcanoes. Admission is free, open 7 days a week 09.00 - 16.45.

#### **El Monumento**

Continue past Mancha Blanca to Tao, turn right until the next roundabout. The MONUMENTO AL CAMPESINO at the right of the road was one of the first creations of the late Cesar Manrique whose intention was to commemorate past generations of Lanzaroteans who stuck to their toil in the fields even after volcanic eruptions had devastated their most fertile land. These hardy early 18th century pioneers invented the irrigation method still in use throughout Lanzarote today. They had noticed that wherever an amount of black volcanic grains known as picon thrown out by the volcano had settled on fertile soil, some type of plant-life eventually emerged from the ground. Soon realising that the grains were porous, farmers began covering their fields with picon. The typical farm house contains a restaurant serving local cuisine. Nearby, the public can watch artisans create traditional arts and crafts which can be purchased in the souvenir shop. Open daily 10.00 -18.00, restaurant 12.00 - 16.30, bar 10.00 - 17.45.



#### San Bartolomé

A short distance along take the right fork towards San Bartolomé. This is the geographical centre of the island and an important agricultural region where vegetables grow in the sandy 'jable' soil, unique on Lanzarote. Sweet potatoes, water melons and squash are the main crops grown in this region. Buildings of interest in the town itself include the Casa Mayor Guerra, the 18th century home of the former military governor of the island.

#### **Tanit Ethnic Museum**

Close to the Town Hall is the Tanit Ethnic Museum which contains a display of the working and cultural life of the island over the past centuries. Open Mon to Sat 10 - 14, closed Sunday.

# Cesar Manrique Foundation

On the outskirts of town cross straight over the main Monument-Arrecife road until passing some ruins on a plateau to the left. Continuing downhill round a sweeping curve for a few hundred metres the imposing white gateway of the FUNDACION CESAR MANRI-QUE appears on your left with its adjoining spacious parking area. The Foundation is housed in what was originally one of the world's most uniquely beautiful homes built by Cesar Manrique for himself and where he lived for over twenty years. Set in a sea of petrified lava and constructed on two levels by interlinking five volcanic bubbles, this residence has attracted journalists from the world's leading architectural magazines and as a work of art in its own right is certainly worth visiting.

In September 1992 only six months after the Foun-dation opened its doors Cesar Manrique was killed a few yards away in a car accident. Without his intuitive genius for enhancing without spoiling natu-

re, Lanzarote would today look just like many other holiday resorts with sunshine and nice beaches. Open Monday to Saturday 10.00 - 18.00 hrs and Sunday 10.00 - 15.00 hrs.

#### Museo Agricola El Patio

The buildings and grounds of El Patio Farm Museum represent an authentic and comprehensive reconstruction of traditional Lanzarote folklore and culture including its unique agricultural history. Take the Arrecife-Tahiche main road, turn right at Tiagua and follow the signs. Mon - Fri 10 - 5.30, Sat 10 - 2.30.

#### **Northern Route Teguise**

The main road north from Arrecife leads to TEGUISE, the capital of Lanzarote for over 500 years until ceding the title to Arrecife in the middle of the last century. Moorish corsairs attacked this old town many times murdering, pillaging and carrying its inhabitants off into slavery. A small alley at the side of the

church in the main square is called Sangre - Blood - on account of Christian blood flowing through the nearby streets on many occasions. Opposite, the SPINOLA PALACE fronted by two stone lions was the home of a wealthy 19th century merchant family which has been restored and is open to the public. Every Sunday and Public Holiday a market is held in and around the square.

The resort of Costa Teguise has five beaches the largest of which is Playa de las Cucharas.

#### Piracy Museum Santa Bárbara Castle

Standing on Mount Guanapay overlooking Teguise is strategically placed to overlook the coastline on both sides of the Island and was originally built to warn the Island capital below if pirates were sighted.

A Piracy Museum is located in the medieval fortress with a wonderful array of interactive screens, panels

and information boards with the names and histories of some of the most famous names of pirates and privateers in maritime history. British and North African buccaneers prowled the waters of the Canaries in search of booty as well as attacking individual islands such as Lanzarote which suffered a series of devastating raids from the 16th until the 18th centuries.

The Pirates Museum open Monday to Friday 9.00 - 16.00 Sunday and Public Holidays 10.00 - 16.00. Currently closed for alterations.

# Timple Music Museum Palacio Spinola, Teguise

This museum in the beautiful interior of the 19th century Spinola Palace is dedicated to the "timple" miniature guitar whose strident tones are known as the "The Sound of the Canary Islands." A timple is an integral part of every folklore group and the museum traces its evolvement on the island since the start of the last century. Fifty-five instruments from all over world are on display, all of which create a similar sound to the "timple", the most well known of these is the Hawaiian ukelele. Open Monday to Friday 9.00 - 16.00 . Sunday and Public Holidays 9.00 - 15.00. Closed Saturday.

#### Haria

The road north passes Los Valles an important agricultural village continuing past several laybys offering commanding views across to the opposite coast. Rounding some sharp curves cut through the cliffs the road descends to HARIA, nestling peacefully in the Valley of 10,000 Palms. Reminiscient of a North African oasis the town was a spa for wealthy Canarians in the past. The Artesanal Market every Saturday 10.00 – 14.30 is rated 5 Stars by Trip Advisor; Arts & Crafts Workshop Mon-Sat 10-14.00.

#### **Manrique House Museum**

Follow the signs to the House Museum of César Marique in Haria. It was the artist's second home where he spent the last few years of his life having converted his original residence into the Foundation at Tahiche which bears his name. Everything has been left in the original state it was in when he died. Open 7 days a week, but advance purchase of tickets is recommended due to limited capacity.

#### Mirador del Rio

Continuing northward past Maguez village a road towards the clifftop leads to Guinate Tropical Park. A short drive on the main road and you arrive at MIRADOR DEL RIO, a belvedere with breathtaking views of the straights below and islands out to sea. Open daily 10.00 - 18.00 hrs.

#### **The Green Caves**

The route continues downhill towards the GREEN CAVES, (open daily 10.00 - 18.00 hrs.), on the opposite coast over a region known as Malpais de la Corona, 'badlands' caused by the eruption of nearby Monte Corona. During an eruption whilst debris is shot out skywards, volcanoes also often break out below ground, a molten lava stream forging a tunnel. One such volcanic tunnel, the Atlan-

tida, is below the earth's surface at this point which at 7 1/2 kilometres is the longest in the world.

#### Jameos del Agua

This large grotto harbouring an underground lake forms the last section of the Atlantida Tunnel and came into being when the molten lava stream met the cooler waters of the nearby Atlantic Ocean. An amenity not to be missed in this wonder of nature embellished by Cesar Manrique, is the underground concert hall located in a massive volcanic cavern. Open daily 10.00 - 19.00 hrs. and Tuesday, Friday and Saturday nights, 19.00 - 03.00 hrs.

#### The Cactus Garden

The route south passes through several villages until reaching an area where the fields are all planted with cacti. Known as the 'tunera' cactus it attracts the female cochineal beetle from which carmine dye is extracted. Dusty white patches on the leaf indicate a colony of this parasite and if crushed turn to bright crimson. Guatiza village is the centre of this cactus crop and is the home of JARDIN DE CACTUS - the CACTUS GARDEN - the seventh and last of the Tourist Centres, which opened in March 1990. Open daily 10.00 - 18.00 hrs



#### **Arrecife**

Continuing south the road leads past a white stone gateway leading to Costa Teguise, one of the three major tourist resorts on Lanzarote. Arriving at the capital ARRECIFE, home to half of the 70,000 inhabitants of Lanzarote, whose tree-lined promenades and SAN GINES Lagoon are beautifully landscaped. A colourful street market takes place on the promenade every Wednesday selling traditional island arts and crafts among other items.

The main shopping area is in and around Calle Leon y Castillo which has a drawbridge at one end leading to SAN GABRIEL Castle, the Arrecife History Museum. A drive around the NAOS fishing harbour past some abandoned windmills leads to another medieval fort, CASTILLO SAN JOSE, whose 18th century interior was converted by Cesar Manrique in 1974 to house the International Museum of Contemporary Art. Open daily 11.00 - 21.00 hrs. On the lower floor an excellent restaurant with panoramic views out to sea. Open daily 10.00 - 01.00 hrs

#### **Marina Lanzarote**

Just a short walk from the town centre along the seafront leads to the shops and restaurants of the luxury Marina Lanzarote, newly-opened in October 2014. A first class selection

of shops and boutiques overlooking the colourful tableau of transatlantic yachts bobbing at their moorings await the visitors as well as dining facilities to suit every taste and every pocket, offering everything from local and international cuisine to smart snack bars and cafeterias.

#### **Golf - Theme Park**

The island has two 18 hole par 72 golf clubs at Puerto del Carmen and Costa Teguise as well as Rancho Texas animal theme park at Puerto del Carmen.

#### **Rancho Texas**

Rancho Texas is an animal and water park close to Puerto del Carmen and just off the main island road. Among multiple attractions: a live sea lion show, dolphin interaction, a huge pool with water slides, a splash park and a country and western show. Among services is a free bus pick up. Open 265 days a year.

#### La Graciosa & Fuerteventura Ferry

Lineas Maritimas Romero operate frequent sailings from Orzola Harbour to La Graciosa as well as excursions from Puerto del Carmen. Other services include: Water-taxi Puerto del Carmen-Puerto Calero and Water-bus Playa-Blanca- Marina Rubicón-Papagayo. Departure and arrival times are convenient for tourists wishing to spend a whole or half day on Lanzarote's sister isle.

The neighbouring island of Fuerteventura is only 30 minutes away by Líneas Romero from Playa Blanca to Corralejo.





# **Picturesque Chimneys**

# Decorate Lanzarote Roof Tops

Luis Ibañez, architectural designer and impassioned environmentalist, explains the differing characteristics of the numerous chimneys adorning the roofs of houses and public buildings on the Island

Born in Tarrasa (Barcelona) Luis Ibañez came to Lanzarote in 1960 and has been actively involved in safeguarding traditional Lanzarote architecture stressing the importance of building new homes or refurbishing older ones in the manner of past generations.

Together with César Manrique, Pepe Dámaso and Yayo Fontes, Luis Ibañez purchased and refurbished the premises of El Almacen in Arrecife in 1974 as the first cultural centre in the island capital. He also accompanied César Manrique when the artist was taking photographs all over the island for his landmark work on the traditional architecture of the island – "Lanzarote – arquitectura inédita" which was launched at El Aljibe Art Gallery in El Almacen.

Luis Ibañez designed Puerto Calero Marina for proprietor José Calero, which opened in 1989 as well as creating models of five traditional houses for home owners to choose from. He also served as honorary artistic director for the Ayuntamientos of Tias and Yaiza, the Boutique Hotel Palacio de Princesa Ico in Teguise and the refurbishment of Casa Mayor Guerra in San Bartolomé, the residence of the first Military Governor of Lanzarote.

Other works include the Casa Eólica Wind Farm in Los Valles, the protective outer wall in Puerto del Carmen harbour and designed certain features at Lanzarote Airport. In combination with César Manrique he refurbished the premises of La Era at Yaiza as a restaurant, one of only three edifices in the municipality left standing after the volcanic eruptions of the nearby Fire Mountains in the early 18th century. (It is now a boutique hotel.) Luis also refurbished important buildings in Betancuria on Fuerteventura.

Soon after the opening of Lanzarote's first tourist hotel, Los Fariones in Puerto del Carmen in 1967, General Manager José Figue-

reo asked Luis Ibañez to suggest a traditional local item to send to 1,000 of their clients all over Europe as a New Year's greeting. He suggested miniatures of Lanzarote chimneys, a different one each year for which Luis would sketch a scaled-down version with exact measurements.

Luis has won many architectural and environment awards including the Silver Merit for Tourism and the Environment from the Canarian Government in 1995 for carrying out projects in a "totally honorary capacity and for constant efforts throughout his artistic career to conserve the environment."

#### 24 Basic Styles of Traditional Chimney

There are 24 basic styles of traditional chimney and originally the three sizes large medium or small reflected the station in the life of the occupant. Outstanding examples of the most elaborate chimneys still grace the roofs of two truly traditional 18th century homes, Casa Mayor Guerra at San Bartolomé, residence of the island's military governor and Spinola Palace in Teguise, home of a wealthy family of

merchants. Both are now the property of their respective Town Halls who have meticulously restored them to their original state, and are open to the public.

No one knows the exact origin of the variety of picturesque chimneys seen throughout the island and why Lanzarote is the only Canary Island where so many designs are to be found. Described generally as Byzantine, they originated on the Algarve and were probably first built to adorn the homes of Portuguese as a reminder of their homeland when they settled on Lanzarote. Early in the 15th century, Portugal had unsuccesfully laid claim to the Canary Islands.

Modest homes had smaller chimneys on their roofs. The rounded shape of an oven bulging out from the kitchen wall can still be seen throughout the island. Food was cooked in pots placed on two stones above a wood-burning hearth, the smoke, fumes and cooking odours being dispersed via outlets in the chimney. Nowadays traditional chimneys serve in the main solely as a decorative feature, many apertures on the older refurbished ones, have been filled in.

Spinola Palace was built by Feo Peraza between 1730 and 1780. His son José Feo de Armas was the mansion's most famous resident. The name of the Spinola building appears in the local register for the first time in 1895. In 1984 Casa Spinola building was carefully restored under the supervision of César Manrique and the ownership was transferred to Teguise Town Hall





#### **Epilogue**

Arguably, the first use of a working chimney serving serve as a decorative feature, may be attributed to innovative Catalan architect Antoni Gaudi (1852-1926). At the beginning of the 19th century he designed, Casa Pedrera, an up-market apartment block on the corner of Barcelona's most fashionable boulevard Paseo de Gracia and placed chimney tops of varying designs and at different heights on the roofs.




The reality of the audiovisual as  $oldsymbol{1}$  background to the movie was principally brought to life by the testimony of people who had acted or were related to the actors. Teresa Coll and Malola de la Hoz whose characters belonged to the same tribe as the star Raquel Welch; and the son of Bernardo Niz, at that time a famous Canarian Wrestling champion known as the Pollo de Arrecife who played a major role with his name on the billboard. The premiere at Cine Atlantida was attended by 400 people who greeted the film with standing applause. It has since been shown various times on Lancelot Digital.

Principle photography was shot at El Golfo, a green lake bordered by black sand in the Fire Mountains and was the first Hollywood production on Lanzarote with Raquel Welch wearing a costume described as "Cave Man Bikini!" Sixty years later the poster is still selling.

Lanzarote extras included Mercedes and Teresa Coll, Mati Fiestas, Tita Tenorio, Luisa Romero and Marilola de la Hoz. In the interview Teresa Coll and Marilola de la Hoz recalled "originally, the producers wanted the girls to wear the same scanty costumes as Raquel Welch in the famous poster but at that time the highly conservative government of General Franco ruled Spain and we did not want to risk their reaction but finally agreed to compromise and wore a more modest styled miniskirt. The pay was 300 pesetas a day plus meals).

Bernardo Niz, son of Heraclio Niz spoke about his father. "The Ayun-

in the *National Geographic* magazine January 1969 issue with the caption: "At Your Service!" 'Heraclio Niz Mesa, flashes a smile of 24-carat gold hospitality for visitors to Arrecife for which he received a special award from the Spanish Government in the 1960s."

### A History of Moviemaking in the Canaries

Movie making in the Canary Islands dates back to 1896, when a cameraman for French pioneer movie makers the Lumiere Brothers took some background shots on his way to Central America. Since then the spectacular beauty of the varied Canary landscape has paraded the scenario for over 200 hundred films, TV series and documentaries spanning drama, adventure, science fiction and westerns.

### Gregory Peck - Rita Hayworth "César Manrique"


International film production began in 1956 with the John Huston filming of Moby Dick starring Gregory Peck which was mostly shot in Las Palmas. Rita Hayworth came to Lanzarote in 1974 to film her last movie, Road to Salina for a French-Italian company. It was a gangster film about smuggling filmed along the road from Salinas de Janubio to El Golfo. The last day of production coincided with the opening of a night club at Jameos del Agua and the designer of the Tourist Centre, César Manrique, invited her as guest of honour. The very next day she travelled to Paris for a press conference about the movie where she was asked about the location. She said "I have come from witnessing the creation of the eighth wonder of the world by an artist named César Manrique on the island of Lanzarote. She was then asked, and "where's that?"

#### Rock Hudson, Morgan Freeman, Dennis Quaid, Penelope Cruz

In 1983, Wolfgang Petersen filmed Enemy Mine starring Dennis Quaid in the crater of the Cuervo Volcano in the Fire Mountains. British ambient music pioneer Brian Eno performed a concert in the same volcano some years later and installed his video installation in the Green Caves, his first in Europe. In the 1980s, several episodes of the cult TV series The Martian Chronicles starring Rock Hudson were shot on Lanzarote; Franklin Schaffner produced the Planet of The Apes in 1968 and Val Guest, When Dinosaurs



ruled the World in 1970. The Shawshank Redemption starring Morgan Freeman and Tim Robbins came out in almost 30 years later in 1994. In this cult movie, the main character Andy Dufresne spends 19 years building a tunnel whose entrance was concealed by the Raquel Welch pos-

ter at the time of his escape.

In 2008, award-winning Spanish producer Pedro Almodóvar produced a major section of Abrazos Rotos (Broken Embraces) starring Penelope Cruz at El Golfo in the same scenario as Raquel Welch in One Million Years B.C.

Mararía is a novel written by Rafael Arozarena 1 from the Canary Islands and published in 1973. Mararía is considered a classic work of Canarian literature.



The carnival procession is a massive affair in which individual creativity is expressed through costume, and popular sentiment is revealed by the lyrics of the murgas musical bands dressed in spectacular uniforms, writes Mike Eddy. The final act of Carnival is the Funeral of the Sardine being burnt on the beach.











### **Two Centuries of Irish Lanzarote Connections**

The work that Lanzarote Ireland Network has carried out in collaborating with the Canarian Government in the first trade mission between the Islands, has flourished over the years into strong and valuable relationships. The result is that with 300,000 visitors per year Lanzarote is the number one Winter Destination for Irish travelers

#### **John Topham from Cork**

Irish Connections to Lanzarote stretch back to the end of the 1880s when the first imports of Canarian Emerald Isle especially during the winter months. Greengrocers were stocked with tomatoes and onions, mostly from the Canary Islands but especially Lanzarote. If we turn the clock back one and a half centuries it is remarkable to realize that nearly every single hotel and apartment block now located in Puerto del Carmen - by far the favourite resort of Irish holidaymakers on Lanzarote is standing on what were once fields upon fields of tomatoes and onions among other fruit and vegetables.

Cork who settled in Arrecife and was later known as Vice Consul Juan Topham who exported fruit and vegetables to Ireland and other European countries among into a prominent local family Otilia Diaz and founded a dynasty on Lanzarote which produced one of the island's most famous teachers Adolfo Topham. The Topham's original home is now being restored by Arrecife Town Hall under Mayoress Astrid Pérez to be declared a Monument of Historical Significance. His great nephew, journalist Guillermo Topham, senior correspondent of the respected regional daily La Pro-

vincia received the title, Chronicler of Lanzarote from the Cabildo Island Government.

### Dollar Bay - County Wexford - Trinity College Archives

A famous Scottish seaman and historian, George Glas, wrote a landmark history of the ancient inhabitants of Lanzarote and Fuerteventura which was published in 1764, and is still used by scholars today. Glas was returning to England with his wife and daughter in his boat the Earl of Sandwich, when four members of the crew mutinied and killed Glas and his family off the coast of Wexford as they suspected he was carrying a large amount of the fortune he had amassed whilst trading in the Canary Islands. Among the treasures were

### Economic Recovery - GDP Growth by 10% in 2022



Canarian President Ángel Victor Torres

Canarian President Ángel Victor Torres attributes the leadership of the Canary Islands in the economic recovery and the historical employment data to unity and consensus. GDP grew by 10% in 2022, double the national average with the same increase forecast for 2023. The tourism sector recovered 96% of the pre-pandemic total of visitors with more spending per head.

The excellent figures confirm the growth path of tourism worldwide, and the leadership and global reach of FITUR, which has registered significant growth in all its parameters, practically equalling its all-time record figures: more than 222,000 attendees, almost double the number in 2022 -136,000 professionals, 68% more, which practically triples last year's attendance. In addition, the FITUR LIVE Connect digital platform recorded more than 56,000 registrations, representing an increase of over 80% compared to 2022. The fair brought together 8,500 participants, 131 countries, 755 exhibitors, and occupied over 66,900 m2 of exhibition space.







### Increased Connectivity

### 122 Destinations - 2000 Weekly Flights

Canarian Government Tourism Councillor Yaiza Castilla met at Fitur with the main airlines and tour operators to agree on promotional and co-marketing initiatives leading to allowing maximum occupation on flights aimed at reducing the carbon imprint.

This summer the Canary Islands will consolidate the boom in air connectivity that it experienced last year and in the summer season it will be connected with 122 destinations belonging to 28 different markets and with 1,929 weekly frequencies in a typical week, 196 more than in the pre-pandemic year.

From April to October, the islands will be connected to 122 cities, one more than in 2019, although the destinations vary because some disappear as a result of the war in Ukraine, which affects not only this country, but also places close to the conflict such as cities in Poland, Russia and some in Germany, while other destinations are incorporated, such as French, Italian, Spanish and some German cities.

Castilla explained that Turismo de Canarias "has made great progress in diversifying markets, not only with an increase in connections from Italy and France, but also with the incorporation of Iceland, Slovakia and the United Sta-

tes compared to the pre-pandemic year."

The Canary Islands Tourism delegation met in the framework of Fitur with the representatives of Iberia Express, Booking, Lufthansa, eDreams, Air Europa, TUI, easyJet, Ryanair, Eurowings, Jet2, Vueling or Expedia, among others.

In all these meetings, sustainability and the reduction of CO2 emissions were addressed as a primary topic. At each fair we concentrate on the calculation of the carbon footprint of each airline that operates with the Canary Islands and notice progress as the renewal of the fleet with more efficient aircraft has become a priority allowing The Canary Islands attended Fitur with an unstoppable increase in the demand for trips to the Islands despite economic circumstances

According to Canary Government Councillor for Tourism, Yaiza Castilla "The desire to travel is above any determining factor and which we will continue to promote through

targeted activities towards tourists who guarantee a longer stay and spending at the destination, as well as less dependence on connectivity," she was accompanied by the managing director of Tourism of the Canary Islands, José Juan Lorenzo.

"However, despite all this, travel continues unstoppable and the outlook continues to be very positive for the islands, which are experiencing an increase in regular air capacity available both for the spring and summer," Castilla assured.

Compared to the last pre-pandemic year, the Canary Islands had 9 million seats on offer last winter, 25.2% more than in 2019, while for this summer season air capacity increases, by 12.4% more, with 11.2 million scheduled places compared to 9.9 million in the summer of 2019.

A fact that the counselor defined, however, as very positive taking account that last year closed with the consolidated recovery of tourism on the islands, which received 96% of visitors in 2019, some 14.6 million in total.





### 59% Reduction in Carbon Footprint Stand at Fitur

Regarding the sustainability of the Canary Islands stand at Fitur, the Managing Director of Tourism of the Canary Islands, José Juan Lorenzo, explained that the carbon footprint caused by its assembly, use and disassembly has been reduced by up to 59%, which has gone from 18, 75 tons of CO2 last year to 7.72 tons this year. "This considerable decrease is due to the fact that we moved one and a half fewer trailers to Madrid thanks to the fact that the material is more modular, stackable and less bulky. In addition, the operators in charge of its assembly are eight less than last year, so we also reduce personnel travel and lodging, in addition to directly contracting services such as fastening and anchoring and cleaning the elements locally", Lorenzo added.

Ryanair continues to be, by far, the leading airline in the Canary Islands, with 4.5 million seats per year. Currently, they have their most extensive schedule since their arrival in the islands and they will reopen the bases in Lanzarote and Tenerife Sur starting in the summer, with 4 planes and 6 new routes. In terms of sustainability, this company is one of the most efficient in Europe and also in traffic to the Canary Islands, with a fleet that is constantly being renewed and with the constant obiective of reducing consumption and, therefore, emissions to continue lowering costs.

The British airline **easyJet**, which has the tour operator easyJet Holidays, operates from 6 European countries to the Canary Islands with a total of 39 routes. Their commitment to the archipelago is growing, to the point that they increase their programming to the islands by 74% in summer compared to the pre-pandemic year. In addition, this company operates with one of the most efficient fleets in Europe thanks to its constant renewal and the continuous incorporation of lower consumption aircraft.

British **Jet2.com** through tour operator Jet2 Holidays, was received an award as the best in the United Kingdom. It is the leading airline in the islands from the British market, operating 40 routes with the Canary Islands, the result of combining the 10 airports where they have in bases in the United Kingdom with Lanzarote, Fuerteventura, Gran Canaria They announced the completion of a large order for one of the most efficient aircraft on the market for fleet renewal in the coming years.

**Lufthansa**, flies to the Canary Islands from Frankfurt and Munich (Germany), routes that in the future will be operated exclusively by EW Discover, the group's new airline for holiday traffic. Lufthansa grew in the Canary Islands after the pandemic and is among the most efficient companies in terms of sustainability, as it has experienced a considerable reduction in emissions with the introduction of new aircraft since 2020.

**Air Europa,** they have recently declared their intention to connect the Nordic Countries with Spain, given that they already carry out charter operations for other destinations and know the routes. And will resume flights from Barcelona to Tenerife and Lanzarote, after five years of absence.

**TUI** group, operates 5 airlines

82 covering routes from Lanzarote, Fuerteventura, Gran Canaria, Tenerife Sur and La Palma, to 7 countries achieving a drastic reduction in emissions through a substantial incorporation of more efficient aircraft.

As for the Spanish Vueling, it is the second operator in the Canary Islands, only behind Ryanair, with 2.3 million annual arrival seats. It operates to the islands mainly from the mainland market, although it also has international routes such as Amsterdam, Paris, Copenhagen and Billund (Denmark). It flies to La Palma from Barcelona and Bilbao and, in fact, they recover connectivity on the island. In terms of emissions, the fleet is constantly being renewed, with the incorporation of more efficient aircraft.

Finally, a meeting was held with the Hungarian low-cost airline Wizz Air , which enjoys a dominant position in Eastern Europe and is gaining more and more ground in Central European countries and the United Kingdom, with numerous new bases. They started flying in the Canary Islands a few years ago, mostly in Tenerife, with routes from Budapest thanks to incentives from the Flight Development Fund. It is a fundamental airline to connect the islands with Eastern Europe and open up new markets.







### 10 Major European 'Influencers'

With this objective ten 'influencers' from the United Kingdom, Spain and Germany, received various products from the islands to recommend to their 2.3 million followers in a natural and non-intrusive manner.

The Councillor added, "we are seeking to capture the interest of new audiences interested in the culture, well-being and artisan products of the islands through Instagram, which is the main social network for this target audience objective is "to achieve an approach to the territory with the objecti-



ve of viewing Canarian culture from a closer and more personal perspective."

Gofio, cheeses (DOP Palmero, DOP Majorero, DOP Flor de Guía), aloe vera, tuno indio, ceramics, volcanic jewelry, basketry or soaps are some of the artisan products that were received, enjoyed and disseminated. In this way, we reaffirm the position of the Canary Islands as a destination with an authentic and differential personality, beyond the great beauty and variety of its beaches and natural landscapes, and its exceptional climate throughout the year", summarized the Councillor.

#### **History of Zonzamas**

Zonzamas ruins is an important archaeological site north of the road between Tahiche and San Bartolomé and the most complete and best preserved Guanche ruins on Lanzarote and in the Canary Islands. Zonzamas was the grandfather of Guadarfia last Guanche (pre-Hispanic) king of Lanzarote who probably ruled in the mid-fourteenth century. The ruins were part of a fortress sited on a plain protected by low hills from seaborne raiders. During early excavations the thick stone walls of several low dwellings were uncovered according to the Windrush Island Guide by John and Margaret Goulding, England 1969.

#### **Chronology of Occupation**

When excavations began in 1973, only the structure of the "Palacio de Zonzamas" was visible, the rest of the buildings were clogged with sediment and ashes from the 1730 Timanfaya eruptions. Construction began in the fifth century, being occupied until the eighth century, when



it was abandoned. In the 12th century there is a reoccupation, which builds on what had been covered by sediments. At least until the 18th century non-buried constructions were in use, and it is assumed that their definitive abandonment occurred during the 1730-1736 eruptions in the Fire Mountains which was the origin of what we now know as Timanfaya National Park now

Lanzarote's most popular tourist attraction.

#### **Current Works**

The latest works over a period of 28 months cover an area of 1700 m2 with a budget of 2.7 million euros and is due to conclude in 2024. During construction, pre-arranged guided visits by small parties will continue.

### Biography of artist Pancho Lasso

CEO Tourist Centres Benjamin Perdomo has announced the publication of a biography of artist Pancho Lasso whose works are on permanent display at MIAC Art Gallery.

Pancho Lasso Morales (born Arrecife 1904 died Madrid 1973) was a sculptor who studied at the Arrecife School of Fine Arts and later moved to Madrid through the grant of a scholarship by the Lanzarote Cabildo. He became friends with the sculptor Alberto Sanchez whose influence caused his work to evolve from a neo-cubist style to a surrealist perspective rooted in popular culture.

He worked with a variety of materials, plaster, cement and particularly wood. During the Spanish Civil War 1936-1939 his style evolved towards realism. He abandoned his artistic activities until the 1960s when he began to work as a medal designer. He was politically active in Lanzarote, with strong left wing leanings.

His work spans a large range of styles, from a traditional academic at the start of his career to a politically-committed avant-garde perspective and has also been included in the most important avant-garde exhibitions. Pancho Lasso's creations deal with themes like community values, the world of work, nature and life: life and society, in short.

"The highly individual work of Pancho Lasso stands out. Listening to his own creative voice, he reveals the deep hallucinatory message of the Canaries which watched over his birth. He was never able to escape the pull of its landscape." From a report by Agustin de la Hoz in La Provincia newspaper 14 July, 1973.

Victor Hernández Gopar was employed at Janubio Salt Works and because of his expertise in the technique of extracting salt by evaporation was promoted to the post of foreman in 1885. In tandem with his work, Fernández Gopar became a poet and folk singer singing songs about social injustice, the hard labour and poverty endured by farmers on the land and workers at the salt works. His music and lyrics are of historical importance as they reflected the social inequality of the time and still form part of the repertoire of local folklore groups especially in Yaiza District. By public accord, the name of the theatre in the Island capital Arrecife, is named El Salinero for him.

Janubio, the most picturesque of all the salt works on the island, is visited by hundreds of thousands of tourists annually on their way to Charco de los Clicos Green Lagoon at El Golfo.Located on the seashore south-west of Yaiza and the Fire Mountains, Janubio is the name of the salt works and of the lake.

### Refurbishment of Casa Ajei San Bartolome



The Mayor of San Bartolomé Isidro Pérez was pleased at the renovation of the cultural centre Casa Ajei, which bears the original pre-Hispanic name of the town



Casa Ajei is an 18th century building with well defined traditional Canarian architecture. It was popularly known as La Casa de Los Ferrer the surname of the owners. Later it was renamed Casa Ajei, seeking to recover the indigenous pre-Hispanic name of the town of San Bartolomé. Currently it is part of the Ayuntamiento of San Bartolomé.

#### **History**

The residence was built in 1720 as a large family home, with rooms for a winery which was purchased one hundred years later by Tomás Ferrer and Bárbara Ramírez. At the beginning of the 20th century, the residents of the town would assemble there for singing and dancing as well as to watch theatrical performances which raised funds to build the Porvenir de San Bartolomé Society.

#### **Ajei Folklore Group**

This house was the headquarters of the San Bartolomé Folklore Group named Ajei and directed by folklore musician and owner of the local mill José María Gil. The Ayuntamiento of San Bartolomé acquired the building in the middle of the 20th







century which they reformed and adapted for educational and cultural activities. For some years it was the headquarters of the San Bartolomé Secondary Education Institute.

#### **Architectural Style**

Casa Ajei is a perfect example of traditional Canarian architecture, with a large open central patio, which communicates with all the rooms in the house. The northern



wing has large rectangular shaped rooms with a gabled roof covered with tiles facing a wooden balcony from which a carved basalt stone staircase descends to the central patio. In the south wing the original ceiling of tea beams and oven stone has been well preserved as is the cistern used for storing rain water.

The Casa Ajei building is a declared Historic-Artistic Monument of the Canary Islands.

# Haría becomes the headquarters for the exploration of lunar lava tubes of the 'CoRob-X' project

Haría was converted into the headquarters of the 'CoRob-X' Lunar Lava Tube exploration project early in February. Through state-of-the-art technology 'rovers', Haría hosted the presentation of a four-phase simulation of a lunar exploration mission with the participation of representatives from six countries.

Mayoress Evelia García said, "Our municipality and the Island have such a unique environment that the world of science has chosen us as the venue for their demonstrations. Our enclaves are so unique that the lunar surface can be simulated to perfection."

Evelia García received the assurance that the three rovers do not contain dangerous substances and are made of highly durable metals, plastics and electronic components and do not release harmful residues, harmful to the local environment.

During the phases of the project developed in the municipality the three robots inspected the soil and built a map of the area around the Jameo. One deployed a device with computational payload and

the other robots tracked it down and analyzed its flight path. During the flight, the device collects data with its sensors to create a detailed 3D model of the cave and, when finished, connects back to the communications cable and transmits the data to another of the robots.

West could put his partner in with a Spade and ruff the Club return. Nor would it help to exit with a Spade now as the third trick for East would give his partner the ruff and West would exit with a Diamond, making the King of Hearts later.

No, South found the right solution when he cashed two Diamonds BEFORE exiting with a Spade. So, West ruffed the next Club but could not prevent South from gaining entry to his own hand and take the Heart finesse.


